this book is edited based on a series of lectures on chinese cultural history delivered at the peking university in 2004 it stands out with its distinctive methodology and unique stand and is popular with readers with 17 reprints

for the chinese edition since 2006 before the 1980s traditional culture was often the target of criticisms and put in a negative light in china after the 1980s due to the belief that traditional culture can contribute to modernization people decided to take its essence and discard its dregs as of today most books on this theme have been written in accordance with this principle however in this book the author argues that many problems have emerged from the modernization of the western society and thus the need for reflection and re examining traditional chinese culture is a source for comparison and reflection as such when we discuss traditional culture nowadays not only should we excavate its long hidden meanings but we should also develop contrastive resources to facilitate our collaborative development in future the discussions in this book adopt a vertical structure that begins with how chinese define a human followed by topics on the human body gi food male and female home and state the relationship between heaven and human beings ritual systems historical consciousness thinking patterns the art of expressing sentiments commitments to the politics of virtues and achievements and cultural practices in every chapter there is also a horizontal method of comparison on chinese western and indian cultures to foreground the particularities and advantages of the chinese culture apart from elaborating on the major characteristics of traditional chinese culture there is also a discussion on how the modern disdain for and misunderstandings of the traditional culture originated from the west the author also elaborates on montesquieu s views of china and the various misconceptions and misunderstandings of the traditional chinese legal systems finally it ends with the author s thoughts on the revitalization of the chinese civilization

for centuries the chinese referred to their fiction as xiaoshuo etymologically meaning roadside gossip or small talk and held it in relative disregard

there has been a tendency to neglect the political life of asia in favour of religious and aesthetic considerations the myth of the changeless east dies hard few people are aware that the earliest legislation for the rights of the common man go back to the sumerians and that outlines for a social contract were drawn up by indian buddhists two thousand years before locke and rousseau first published in 1985 patterns of kingship and authority in traditional asia provides an excellent survey of traditional asian ideas of government from the earliest kingdoms of the sumerians and the egyptians to the time when western influence first made itself felt each chapter is written by a specialist on a particular country or region of asia who seeks to identify some of the essential features of its traditional royal or imperial authority particularly fascinating is the way in which traditional institutions continue to have a vital influence upon asian countries the serious reader will obtain a clear outline of traditional asian ideas and systems of government and will indirectly acquire a deeper understanding

of other aspects of asian civilisations

folk songs poetry and more to construct a lively history of the politicians farmers warriors and philosophers who created and shaped the ancient chinese world they also show us the fascinating process of constructing the historical jigsaw puzzle archaeologists discover a 400 000 year old skull near modern day beijing and determine that it is one of our earliest human ancestors a scholar who is prescribed dragon bones to cure an illness realizes that the bones which are actually turtle shells contain ancient chinese writing used to send messages to the gods the fantastic discovery of lady hao s tomb reveals that in ancient china a powerful woman led soldiers into battle the letters exchanged by two military leaders show not only how the chinese invented the sword but also how they used the kite as a military weapon using these ancient artifacts and writings kleeman and barrett weave the dramatic story of rulers writers soldiers and citizens who made up the fascinating and unique world of ancient china

the hawai i reader in traditional chinese culture is a collection of more than ninety primary sources all but a few of which were translated specifically for this volume of cultural significance from the bronze age to the turn of the twentieth century they take into account virtually every aspect of traditional culture including sources from the non sinitic ethnic minorities

this thorough exploration of the aspects of everyday life in china during the tang dynasty 618 907 provides fascinating insight into a culture and time that is often misunderstood especially by those from western cultures here students will find the details of what life was really like for these people how was their society structured how did they entertain themselves what sorts of food did they eat the answers to these and other questions are provided in full detail to bring this golden age of chinese culture alive for the modern reader based mainly on classical translations from the chinese themselves each chapter addresses a specific aspect of daily living in the voices of those who lived during the time a myriad of interesting details are provided to help readers discover among other things what life was like in the city what homes and gardens were like how the role s of men and women differed and the many rituals in which people participated detailed descriptions of the clothes and materials people wore the games they played and the cooking methods they used for specific foods provide readers with the ability to experiment on their own to recreate the time and place so they can have a better understanding of this intriguing culture

this volume introduces readers to classical chinese literature from its beginnings ca 10th century bee to the tenth century ce it asks basic questions such as how did reading and writing practices change over these two millennia how did concepts of literature evolve what were the factors that shaped literary production and textual transmission how do traditional bibliographic categories modern conceptions of genre and literary theories

shape our understanding of classical chinese literature what are the recurrent and evolving concerns of writings within the period under purview what are the dimensions of human experience they address why is classical chinese literature important for our understanding of pre modern east asia how does the transmission of this literature in japan korea and vietnam define cultural boundaries and what in turn can we learn from the chinese style literatures of japan korea and vietnam about chinese literature in addressing these questions the oxford handbook of classical chinese literature departs from standard literary histories and sourcebooks it does not simply categorize literary works according to periods authors or texts its goal is to offer a new conceptual framework for thinking about classical chinese literature by defining a four part structure the first section discusses the basics of literacy and includes topics such as writing systems manuscript culture education and loss and preservation in textual transmission it is followed by a second section devoted to conceptions of genre textual organization and literary signification throughout chinese history a third section surveys literary tropes and themes the final section takes us beyond china to the surrounding cultures that adopted chinese culture and produced chinese style writing adapted to their own historical circumstances the volume is sustained by a dual foci the recuperation of historical perspectives for the period it surveys and the attempt to draw connections between past and present demonstrating how the viewpoints and information in this volume yield insights into modern china and east asia

of typical and characteristic quotes of archaic chinese that have never been translated before ultimately it is a fundamental threshold to learning about chinese people chinese culture chinese morality chinese mentality chinese policy and chinese diplomacy
